The Prime Minister further noted India's efforts to unite the globe, highlighting the nation's leadership at the G20 summit. "When we led the G20, we gave the message of 'One Earth, One Family, One Future'. India working towards connecting the world by taking it out

of conflict," he said. PM Modi also spotlighted India's telecom manufacturing revolution, revealing that in 2014, the nation had only two mobile manufacturing units, while today, there are more than 200.

"Earlier, we imported most of our mobile phones. Today, we manufacture six times more mobile phones than

exporting phones globally. India is not stopping there; we are moving producing towards entirely 'Made-in-India' phones, from chips to finished products. Our investments in semiconductors are substantial,"

he added. Amid growing concerns over cyber threats, the Prime Minister called for a global digital governance framework.

"The time has come for global institutions to acknowledge the need for a framework that governs technology and protects citizens. Technology today transcends borders, and no country can fight cyber threats alone. We must work together to create global 'dos and don'ts' for the digital age," he said. He also stressed India's

Data Protection Act and National Cyber Security Strategy as proof of the country's commitment to a safe digital ecosystem. Highlighting India's rapid digital growth, PM Modi said that in just a decade, the length of optical fiber laid in India is eight

times the distance between the Earth and the Moon. "Two years ago, we launched 5G services, and today, nearly every district in India is connected. India has now become the secondlargest 5G market globally, and we are already progressing rapidly towards 6G technology,'

he said. The Prime Minister also underscored India's efforts to create more opportunities for women in technology leadership,

#### Maha govt brings ordinance on Stamp Duty Act, expects to generate additional Rs 2,000 cr annually

The MahaYuti government has released an ordinance to amend the Maharashtra Stamp Act, 1958 proposing the increase in stamp duty on affidavits, agreements and related documents to Rs 500 from the present Rs 100. The stamp duty on share capital has been increased to Rs 1 crore from Rs 50 lakh.

The ordinance was brought on Monday. According to the revenue department, the amendments to the Maharashtra Stamp Act will help increase the revenue from stamp duty and registration up to almost Rs 2,000 crore. The amendment has been proposed on the lines of Karnataka. The ordinance has come into effect from Monday. The state cabinet chaired by Chief Minister Eknath Shinde had cleared the amendments at its meeting held on September "Schedule I to the Maharashtra Stamp Act is amended to simplify the charge ability under the various articles and in general wherever Rs 100 is provided it is substituted by Rs 500. Article 4 is amended to charge a minimum stamp duty of Rs 500. The affidavit needs to be executed before government or semi-government bodies are brought in the purview of this Article," said the state revenue department note submitted to the cabinet. Article 10 has been amended to increase the stamp duty rate and maximum limit on share capital and increased share capital. Further, Article 47 was amended to bring a change in minimum stamp duty of Rs 500 and a maximum of Rs 50,000 to the instrument of partnership and to change stamp duty of Rs 500 in case of dissolution of partnership. Articles 52 and 58 were amended on the lines of the general amendment to charge a stamp duty of Rs 500 instead of Rs 200. State Revenue Department additional chief secretary Rajesh Kumar said, "With a view to bring simplicity and uniformity in levy of stamp duty and to increase the government revenue, it is proposed to amend certain articles of Schedule I to the Maharashtra Stamp Act, 1958. As the house of the State Legislature is not in session and the Government of Maharashtra is satisfied that circumstances exist which render it necessary for him to take immediate action further to amend the Maharashtra Stamp Act.'





## India's inland waterways transport offers robust growth opportunities via PPPs

The Indian inland waterways transport (IWT) sector presents significant opportunities for growth through publicprivate private partnerships (PPPs), and the government is eyeing expansion of the PPP model to drive development, according to a report on Tuesday.

The focus on expanding PPPs and offering financial incentives, such as discounts up to 35 per cent on freight transported via key national waterways (NW), aims to further attract private sector participation, according to the report Crisil Market bv Intelligence and Analytics.

A subsidy scheme is being formulated for NW-1, NW-2 and NW-16, which traverse key states such as Uttar Bihar, Pradesh, Jharkhand, West Bengal



and Assam, to promote the use of inland waterways for freight transport, the report mentioned. Since the government's strategic shift in 2016,

the number of operational waterways has increased from just three in fiscal 2014 to 26 by fiscal 2024, driven by substantial budgetary support and key initiatives like the Jal Marg Vikas Project.

Launched in 2018 with a financial outlay of Rs 5,369.18 crore, the project aims to enhance the capacity of National Waterway 1 (NW), span-ning 1,390 km along the Ganga-Bhagirathi-Hooghly river system. "India's inland waterways are witnessing significant revitalization driven by targeted investments and policy reforms. The cost advantage is clearly benefiting

this mode of transportation, transporting 1 tonne of freight by waterways is approximately Rs 1.06 per km, notably less than Rs 1.36 per km by rail and Rs 2.50 per km by road," the report argued. The resurgence in the sector has resulted in a marked increase in cargo volumes, surging from 18.1 million tonnes in fiscal 2014 to 132.9 million tonnes in fiscal 2024, with the govern-

ment setting ambitious targets of 200 million tonnes by fiscal 2030 and 500 million tonnes by fiscal 2047.

Digital innovations have played a key role in improving efficiency in IWT the sector. Platforms such as the IWAI Vessel Tracker, PANI Portal and Car-D Portal provide real-time navigation information, updates on cargo tracking, and efficient management of cargo and

passenger data. Water transport also produces lower emissions, less noise and consumes less energy, making it an environmentally-friendly alternative to the traditional road and rail transport.

Waterways are suitable for moving bulk commodities such as coal, iron ore, iron ore fines, sand and minerals.
